

THREE MILE ISLAND ALERT IS THE RESIDENTS INTERVENOR BEFORE THE NUCLEAR REGULATORY COMMISSION ON THE ISSUES OF GPU MANAGEMENT COMPETENCE, OPERATOR TRAINING, AND STEAM GENERATORS AT UNIT 1.

The TMI Unit 1 restart hearings (held Nov., Dec., Jan.) have provided the first public forum for discussion of this startling new information and its implications not only in terms of TMI -1 restart, but in terms of the honesty and integrity of the federal regulators charged with protecting the public health and safety from nuclear hazards. For the first time hard evidence of intentional reporting failures by GPU officials during the accident, and of a subsequent cover-up by the company and the NRC has come to light.

The intervening parties have submitted detailed findings to the Atomic, Safety & Licensing 3 member Panel. The A.S.& L. Panel is currently reviewing the findings and will soon submit a "decision" to the Nuclear Regulatory Commissioners.

Recently GPU has requested the NRC not require plugging for steam generator tubes where degradation up to 70 percent has occurred for cracks or pits less than one-eighth of the circumference of the tube. TMIA, as the result of a motion to reopen the steam tube record, is scheduled to make an hour presention to the NRC Atomic, Safety & Licensing Appeal Board Panel on April 3rd in Bethesda, Maryland.

Evacuation plans for school children are incomplete and don't include contingencies in case bus drivers don't show up, in case children from the same family are bused to different relocation center, and in case children experience mental trauma.

Also note that an informal random survey conducted by the SVA in the summer of 1983 found that 85.4% of parents would not allow their children to be taken to a seperate relocation center.

2. There are no specific plans for evacuation of the elderly, the

handicapped and the blind.

3. Farmers are classified as emergency workers and will be permitted to remain during an accident. To date farmers have no insurance for loss of livestock or crops, and have had no instruction in using dosimeters or potassium iodine for their own protection.

4. Presently the chain of communications starts with GPU. Considering their past history and previous handling of the accident of 1979 it is imperative that an evacuation order be initiated by an independent agency. It is naive to assume that this utility will disseminate information quickly, clearly and honestly.

5. Evacuation routes are unrealistic at best and could turn into major problems. The main evacuation route for Lancaster County, Route 30, in normal times is considered a traffic hazard; in emergency conditions it could be total chaos. For Harrisburg Route 11/15 is a major route

and is equally as congested and hazardous as Route 30.

Also note that evacuation in the summer, when tourism is in full swing in Hershey, Lancaster & Hbg. would be close to impossible. 6. There is no public information campaign to inform the public about the mechanics of evacuation. In the same SVA survey 67.4% of those polled said they would evacuate yet 62.9% said they wouldn't know where to go or who to listen to.

7. On February 8, 1984, the Federal Emergency Management Agency reported that Lancaster and Dauphin Counties are ill prepared to adequately protect residents in the event of a nuclear emergency at TMI. The agency cited five major deficiences and dozens of minor failures in the performance of those counties' officials in a November 16, 1983, emergency preparedness drill. The report also stated that there were shortcomings in York County as well.

8. EVACUATION PLANS ARE IN PLACE FOR "HIGH RISK" AREAS ONLY, OR AREAS WITHIN THE 10 MILE RADIUS OF TMI. THE PLAN ASSUMES THAT ONLY 50% OF THE POPULATION IN THIS AREA WILL EVACUATE. THERE IS NO PLAN INTACT FOR PEOPLE LIVING IN THE SO-CALLED "LOW-RISK" AREAS, OR AREAS 20 to 50 MILES FROM TMI. It is folly to believe that some imaginary steel curtain exists exactly 10 miles from TMI. But for this reason the cities of Harrisburg, Lancaster and York are without evacuation plans.

TMIA MEMBER, LAUREN TAYLOR, VISITS WEST GERMANY AT THE INVITATION

OF THE GREEN PARTY


If I reduce my recent week-long visit to West Germany into one sentence, it is: we are not fighting alone. I left Harrisburg to attend this conference in Munich 2 days after the restart of Three Mile Island Unit 1. I felt personally defeated and mad enough to spit. Combined with intense frustration and a raging paranoia that in my absence another accident would occur and my children wouldn't be evacuated in time, I flew out of JFK airport thinking I should be heading for a sanitarium, not a situation that required a sane representative of Central Pennsylvania.

When I arrived, I found that Germany is having nuclear nightmares of its own. The conference, organized by the Green Party,
addressed nearly all nuclear issues, but focused on the environmental
and health dangers of radioactive releases, waste and reprocessing.
Their issue of concern is the imminent construction of a reprocessing
plant in Wackersdorf, a forrest about 200 miles N.E. of Munich
surrounded by farms and small towns. The government and the nuclear
industry want to destroy an entire forrest to construct the plant.
Members of the Green Party and various anti-nuclear groups hold a
constant vigil (24-hour) at the site, waiting for the bulldozers.
All through the forrest are trees attached with papers bearing the
names of the "godparent" of that tree. Each person will chain themselves to the tree bearing their name when the bulldozers come. They
say, "One person can't save a whole forrest but they can save one
tree". Their determined commitment was sobering.

During the week, I spoke in several small towns near Wackersdorf. At both the conference and these towns, I met many people from all over Europe. They remember Three Mile Island and they care about us. In Cherbonne, France they hold a vigil every March 28th to remember that no nuke is safe and they pray for our health.

According to George Pritchard of Greenpeace (also speaking at the conference) after seeing "We Are the Guinea Pigs", a documentary about the accident made in 1980, the people of a small town in Great Britian, successfully prevented a nuke from being built.

There are so many things I learned and could tell you now, but for the sake of brevity I'll simply express the message of hope the folks over there asked me to pass on to all of you: We all live on one planet. We each fight battles in the same war. Here, our struggle is neither unique or finished. They wish us to take strength in knowing our efforts are supported and of interest to people all over the world.

THREE MILE ISLAND ALERT FORMS MONITORING COMMITTEE

TMIA has established the first area-wide citizens radiation monitoring committee designed specifically to examine current problems with radiation monitoring around Three Mile Island.

The committee will explore how local residents can become directly involved in individual monitoring around the plant, how improvements can be made to current monitoring programs, and how citizens can become involved with the monitoring activities of the "Three Mile Island Public Health Fund". In addition, the group will examine the need for a local county ordinance to control radioactive air emissions from TMI.

TMIA's project will involve local residents from all area groups, as well as those not affiliated with any particular organization.

THIRTEEN CONVICTED IN RESTART PROTEST

On October 2, 1985, by an 8-1 vote, the U.S. Supreme Court denied TMI Alert's request to stay the restart of Three Mile Island Unit 1. Later in the day the Governor refused to intervene, instead he opted to support GPU "in order to ensure the safe operation and production of nuclear power at TMI." With all other avenues exhausted, approximately 50 protesters braved the cold and rain, five hours after the Supreme Court vote was announced, to gather across from the TMI north gate. Sixteen people crossed the road to stand in front of the closed gate and eventually were arrested for "obstructing a public utility right of way," a summary offense.

These protesters have decided to utilize the justification defense whereby: an actor is legally permitted to break the law if the harm he/she is trying to prevent is greater than the harm he/she creates. Obviously, blocking the entrance to the north gate at TMI is substantially less of a risk/danger to the public than the generation of nuclear power by a convicted felon (GPU was convicted in Federal Court of leak-rate falsification at TMI Unit 2).

Further given the degraded condition of the steam tubes/steam generators at Unit 1, restart posed, and poses, an immediate threat to the health and safety of surrounding communities. Yet, given the fact that all other legal avenues were closed and that the danger was clear and imminent, those who have appeared for their individual hearings (13) at the District Justice office in Middletown have been found guilty. given the way the court system has handled the restart case and previous arrests it is unclear if any of the protesters will appeal. (Note: Three of the 76 people arrested on May 29, 1985, the day the NRC voted to restart Unit 1, have dropped their appeals in Dauphin County Court. None are appealing.)

Those arrested October 2, 1985: Eric Epstein, Kay Pickering, John Robinson, Gene Stilp, Dan Welliver, Steve Oliphant, Roxanne Harpster, Josh Hooper, Tony Eisman, Barbara Schultz, Julie Hoskins, Joyce Corradi, Betty Chevey, Linda Braasch, Wendy Smith, and Cherie Friedrich. Although the District Justice found the protesters guilty as charged, he did not impose a fine. They will each pay \$25.00 for costs incurred by the court.

DOWNRIVER FOLKS OPPOSE WATER DUMPING

GPU has not yet addressed how it intends to dispose of 860,000 gallons of decontaminated, but slightly radioactive, water now stored on the island. The NRC has already said the water could not be permanently stored on site and Lancaster County Congressman Robert Walker believes an amendment he attached to an Energy Department appropriation bill in 1981 "effectively stops anyone from dumping that water, ever into the Susquehanna River. GPU, though they would prefer to dump it, won't be making a proposal until next year and nothing is expected to happen with the water until 1987.



This committee has met twice to discuss the kind of monitoring that now exists. Our next meeting will be December 4 at 4:45 p.m. at the EPA office in Middletown with Dr. Bill Kirk. The following work is being done:

Cherie Friedrich will be checking the Reuter-Stokes print-outs at the Dauphin County Emergency Management Office on a regular basis. Joanne Doroshow is writing grant proposals for a radiation monitoring workshop and to support the work of this committee. Debbie Davenport, Urban Nissel and Ray Martin are checking different sources who produce radiation monitoring equipment.

COURT ASKED TO REVOKE GPU LICENSES

The 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia has been asked to strip GPU Nuclear of licenses to operate TMI and the Oyster Creek nuclear power plants. The suit, filed by TMIA, New Jersey SANE, state Sen. John Shumaker, state Rep. Peter Wambach, and Dauphin County Commissioner Lawrence Hochendoner, argues that the license should be revoked as the company lacks the requisite character for operating the plants. This is the same court that revoked an emergency request to revoke the licenses while the NRC was considering the TMI restart.
